## Dearest Friend.



Over the past year, a copy of our revised and updated edition of **Complications: Abortion's Impact on Women (Second Edition)**, was sent to every Canadian Member of Parliament. Additionally, an initiative in the US, delivered over 100 copies to various Congressmen and women across America advising them of the physical, mental and psycho-spiritual effects of abortion on women. Our work and invaluable research is getting into the hands of decision makers, influencers and leaders! ## In store for 2020, we have **four dynamic and pivotal projects underway** to address the needs of citizens and you, our supporters.



Our first project is to publish **short educational video clips** about our research
on our website, YouTube channel, and social
media platforms. This project will allow
people worldwide to become better acquainted with the
research that the Institute disseminates on various topics
concerning the 'sanctity of life'. The videos will enable
viewers to utilize the Institute's research for their own
activities. For example, video content based on our
updated edition of *Complications: Abortion's Impact on Women* could improve the quality of pregnancy centre
services, abortion prevention through education, and
post-abortive care.

In addition to enhancing access to this research, we will feature the Institute's palliative care experts in videos which will relay practical information to health care workers and leaders about 'best practices' in end-of-life care. As you may already know, the Canadian federal government has indicated it will be **expanding medical aid in dying in Canada** to include patients with illnesses that don't necessarily have a clear trajectory towards death, such as chronic pain or psychiatric conditions. Please refer to some of our resources online to learn more about this and how it may affect your loved ones and community going forward.

Our second project will occur later this year, when we plan on leading two seminar series for front-line agency workers, members of the community, our supporters, and interested guests. The first seminar will focus on women's health and abortion, based on the findings in *Complications*. The second seminar will focus on end-of-life care, and specifically address issues such as conscientious objection, Canada's legalization of euthanasia and physician-assisted suicide, palliative care, and medical decisions at the end of life. These seminars will be vital resources for women, families, seniors, and others with a vested interest in reproductive health or healthcare at the end of life. They will feature renowned speakers and experts on these topics who will facilitate meaningful dialogue and analysis.

Our third project concerns sharing the Institute's work. We plan to host movie nights and continue to disseminate our findings through the distribution of our print publications and participation in various conferences throughout the year. This will hopefully help to garner a younger and more diverse audience and foster new ties to local groups.



Lastly, our fourth project is already underway and involves **creating an online encyclopedia** encompassing various bioethical issues and accessible to everyone on our website! This is

a formidable goal meant to increase access to resources on various topics dealing with beginning to end-of-life issues. Readers will find informative articles on pertinent topics along with recognized speakers and experts. The first of these articles is *scheduled to be released in May*, please stay tuned to our website and emails for details!

## THE GOALS OF THESE PROJECTS INCLUDE:

- Increasing public recognition about the detrimental physical, psychological, and spiritual effects of abortion on women.
- Sharing the female narratives about the abortion experience, including healing options postabortion.
- Educating internet users and digital media consumers about the distinctions between palliative care and medical assistance in dying (an umbrella term for euthanasia and physician assisted suicide).
- Providing easily-accessible educational material to third-party users who wish to educate leaders, the people of influence, and communities about the truth concerning euthanasia and assisted suicide.



It is extremely encouraging to see the way the world is pulling together to sacrifice so much to protect the lives of the vulnerable and the elderly. This is a heartening response to see so many lives being protected and is a wonderful example of a caring society.
