MISSING GRRLS: Sex-selective abortion

Over 160 million girls are missing worldwide, due in large part to the selective termination of females in utero. This practice is called gendercide.





In 2020 in China 51.3% of the population is male, and only 48.7% is female.1 This represents 18.7 million missing women if the ratios are $50/50.^2$



From 2013-15 the total sex ratio in India was 900 females for every 1000 males.³ In 2016 the ratio at birth was 877 females per every 1000 males, an increase to 12.3% fewer females.4



Today, sex-selective abortion is taking place in some communities in North America.³

These cultures share a preference for sons, and pressure to implement population control.

Ultrasound and amniocentesis are used to identify and abort girls.

Can we countenance the intentional destruction of millions of unborn females in the name of a woman's right to choose?

As men reach reproductive age, a marriage squeeze occurs. Consequently, girls in Asia are being abducted and sold for marriage.
